Dear Friends,

George Bernard Shaw once remarked that the only smart person he knew was his tailor who took new measurements of him every time he ordered a new suit. He never assumed that he always remained the same. Therein lies the reason that we return to the High Holy Days again come September and the Hebrew month of **Tisbri**. Each and every one of us, like Shaw, changes each year. Though most of us think and act as though change is best when accomplished dramatically, as the tailor or seamstress

knows, it often occurs a little bit at a time.

The word *Shana* means year, the beginning of a new cycle. Each year is in some ways like the last, but in other ways a time of change. Spring, summer, fall and winter come and go and our calendars are filled with endless notations of meetings and events, holidays and memories. And every once in a while, a recollection of something that has made a significant difference in our lives reshapes us and even gives us added dimension and depth. ***“Lshana tova ...”***

Shinui is the word for change in Hebrew and it is from the same root as the word *shana*. And each is connected to the root of a word from the *V'ahavta*, *“v'shinantam l'vanecha – teach your children.”* Life, as in teaching, is filled with repetition. Our parents, teachers and mentors touched our lives because in that repetition they creatively helped us learn and grow with ever so subtle changes. Those altered adjustments and little differences have helped us, change and hopefully mature, across the seasons of our lives even in the face of life's challenges as in this year. ***“Lshana tova ...”***

As we come to the Jewish Holy Days, *Yamim Noraim*, our sacred Days of Awe, we will greet one another or send cards: ***“Lshana tova ...”*** But in the face of the real world, it too often rings hollow. These are challenging times. The recession has thrown us. Financial uncertainty of a global economy makes us uncomfortable and worriers even in the sanctity of our own homes. The world is filled with violence. Peace remains a distant dream for Israel. Nuclear nightmares are not uncommon. American military forces yet seem bogged down in Afghanistan and visions for Iraq remain unfulfilled. But we Jews are people of hope who have not only persevered, but thrived, time and again across history. So let us never be hesitant to enthusiastically remind one another, ***“Lshana tova ...”***

Translated it means, **“May you be inscribed for a good, sweet New Year!”**

Good is what we passionately wish for ourselves, our loved ones, our people, our nation and for this troubled world. But why, “May you be inscribed?” Judaism teaches us that God opens the Book of Life, with the purpose of inscribing a judgment about the destiny of each and every one of us. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are not only the “Days of Awe,” but also the “Days of Judgment.” On Rosh Hashanah our destiny is written, tradition teaches, and on Yom Kippur our fate is sealed. The poetry is powerful, but are we deserving? Have we squandered the past year, been absorbed in narcissism or simply covered in fear? Have we earned our place in the Book of Life? We are God’s pen and ink. We push the pen to write the ultimate decree on our lives. What better way to begin this year’s ledger than by saying to one another, **“L’shana tova ...”**

As the days turn to weeks and the weeks to seasons, we are called to return to the synagogue for our High Holy Days with some sense of solemnity. While we have each had failings this year, have we not each also been granted some blessings? To fail to be grateful for the goodness we have had would be to distort the true picture of our lives. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are about serious things, but they are also a time for celebration and thanksgiving; for the awe of touching the sacred; for the opportunity to create blessings for ourselves, and others; and for the courage to hope for years to come. This is our Jewish raison d’être. **“L’shana tova ...”**

There was a time when the slogan *“Shver zu sein a Yid, It is hard to be a Jew”* would be understood by the average Jew. People were Jews because of the “yoke of the commandments” but ironically 250 years ago, the Hasidim and then Reform Jews were a reaction to that. Today, we are the new Hasidim and we are each Jews by Choice, not Jews by genetics or accident of birth. Not only those who formally convert to Judaism, but also those of us born Jews have many options. If we celebrate these Holy Days, it is because of choice. If we live by the Jewish calendar and customs, teachings and values, it is because of our own free will. When we come together for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and for a myriad of other Jewish experiences and opportunities at Temple Israel it is because we are Jews by conviction! We are neither fundamentalist, traditionalists nor secular rejectionists. Judaism at Temple Israel is a clarion call to bidding us to be not only Jews by Choice but Jews by conviction. **“L’shana tova ...”**

May the letters & the values of Torah be reflected in your words & deeds.

May God bless us as we bless one another with these sacred words:

“L’shana tova tikateivu ...”

May you & your loved ones be inscribed for a good year!”

Worship in the Sanctuary and the Ballroom

Our Rabbis' and Cantors' inspirational and eloquent presence is infused with the warmth and drama of the beautiful music of the Holy Days. We invite all of our families to join us for worship in either the Sanctuary or the Ballroom and especially encourage those with children ages 3rd grade and older. Sanctuary worship includes the majestic sounds of our professional choir, while Ballroom worship incorporates contemporary,

participatory music with our professional musicians.

Worship in the Ballroom is held on Rosh Hashanah Morning, Kol Nidre (Yom Kippur Eve) and Yom Kippur Morning. On Erev Rosh Hashanah, we invite the entire congregation to welcome the New Year together in our Sanctuary, this year at 6pm. For Yom Kippur Afternoon/Yizkor/Neilah, we again worship all together in the Sanctuary beginning 3:00-6:15 pm.

Bring non-perishable foods to Temple (including household, paper goods, soup & toothpaste etc.) Other items needed are: Peanut Butter, Canned Fish, Pasta/Rice, Canned Fruit, Canned Vegetables, Baby Food, Powdered Milk & Canned Soups.

Our High Holy Day Food Drive begins on Rosh Hashanah through Thanksgiving. Bring your food & other non-perishable items with you to every service. Our Social Action Committee will provide sturdy bags. Collection bins are in the lobby. Our drive helps meet real needs including the need for each of us to perform again and again

the *mitzvah* of *tzedakah*.

Please bring your Tzedakah Box from Mitzvah Day or any Tzedakah Box or Pushke and empty it in the TI Lobby from Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur for our collective charitable gifts to be distributed by the Social Action Committee to those in need in our community and beyond. Recalls will also occur at Chanukah and Purim, as well as TI Mitzvah Day. (Congregants who have not yet received a TI Tzedakah Box may pick one up from the TI Office or the sanctuary lobby during the High Holy Days.)

The monies go to the TI Tzedakah Fund to help the hungry and the needy in our community and beyond administered by our Social Action Committee and our Clergy.

Toddler & Children’s Program

For children ages 2.4 - 4 years old, professional babysitting will be provided. Children in Pre-K-4th are also eligible for this service, though we encourage 3rd & 4th grade children to attend our Worship Services with their parents & older siblings.

Our goal is to make the children feel welcome and safe in our synagogue and to enable our parents to wor-

ship with the knowledge that their child(ren) are enjoying their own High Holy Day experience. There is no fee for this service but advance registration is required.

Please indicate whether your child(ren) will join us on your High Holy Day form. You must pre-register your child(ren) for the program. Please be aware that we reserve the right—for safety reasons—to deny non-registered children entry into the program if we feel insufficient childcare workers are present. The security, happiness and safety of our children are our primary concern. Reservations received after September 14 will be assessed a \$25 late fee.

Light snacks will be served. No food may be brought into the program because of our concern for food allergies.

Parents must drop off and pick up their children enrolled in the Toddler & Children's Program. Children will be released to their parents or to other adults only with the written permission arranged at the time of registration.

What time is the Yizkor Memorial Service?

The Yizkor Memorial Service is part of the Afternoon Service which begins at 3pm on Yom Kippur Day.
